Material to be Covered: This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to the study of American government and politics. The course will cover four broad areas: the foundations of American politics, individuals and politics, linking citizens and government, and institutions and policymaking. Within each of these areas we will focus more on theory and less on description. By the end of the course, students should be able to answer the following questions. First, why is the American system organized the way it is? How does it compare with other systems? Second, how has the American system changed over the years? What caused these changes? Third, how do citizens interact with the American system? How do they organize their beliefs? How do they participate in politics?

Journal Entries: Students are expected to participate in class. This means students should have finished all the assigned readings before class and be an active participant in discussion. However, given the number of students, it will be difficult for every student to participate. Given that, students will be asked to complete some journal entries. At the end of the semester, you will be assigned two journal grades.

First, you must complete five journal entries. These journals entries will be **DUE** at **11:59PM** on the following dates: **1/29**, **3/11**, **3/18**, **4/15**, and **4/22**. 10% of your final grade will be the number of journals you successfully completed, meaning if you miss one journal your grade automatically goes down 2%. Here, "completion" simply means you have a reasonable journal entry that is 250-500 words long, where "reasonable" implies you put forth some effort towards completing the assigned task.

Second, we will randomly select one of your journal entries. We will grade this (and only this) entry using the rubric outlined on Blackboard. Your grade on this entry will be worth 10% of your final grade. Also, In the meantime, if you would like to know how you are doing, feel free to bring your journal entries into our office hours. We will be happy to go over them. Email submissions will not be accepted. You must come in person.

Quizzes: In weeks where journal entries are not assigned we will have an online quiz. These quizzes will help you prepare for the exams. These quizzes will be **DUE** at 11:59PM on the following dates: 2/5, 2/12, 2/26, 3/4, and 4/8. There will also be three review quizzes. These quizzes will be **DUE** at 10:59AM on the following dates: 2/16, 3/22, and 5/5.

Midterm Exams: There will be two midterm exams, each of which will be multiple choice. These exams will be on 2/18 and 3/24. Each midterm exam will be worth 20% of your

final grade.

Final Exam: The date final exam will be on Monday, May 9th from 10:00AM—12:00PM. The final exam will be worth 20% of your final grade. The final exam will be multiple choice, with half of the questions covering material since the midterm and half of the questions covering material from the whole course.
