Material to be Covered: This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to the study of state politics. The course will cover two broad areas: the foundation of state politics and states in action. Within each of these areas we will focus extensively on the state of Missouri. By the end of the course, students should be able to answer the following questions. First, why are state governments organized the way they are? How does the state

of Missouri compare to other states? Second, how has Missouri changed over the years? What caused these changes? Third, how do states affect our lives? What types of policies do they pass? Are any of those policies unique to Missouri? To answer these questions, each week we will begin with a focused discussion on the assigned readings, then on Friday we will relate those readings to Missouri. As students of the University of Missouri, many of the topics will be relatable. Given that, students are encouraged to bring their own ideas and opinions to class every day.

Writing Assignments: There will be two writing assignments over the course of the semester, one will be due on 10/6, the other on 12/10. Each will be approximately 5-7 pages long and will be worth 15% of your final grade. Each assignment will be posted two weeks in advance of the due date.

Participation and Short Assignments: Students are expected to participate in class. This means students should have finished all the assigned readings before class and be an active participant in discussion. Additionally, there may be occasional short writing assignments. Each short assignment will be posted one week in advance of the due date. Your final participation grade (including the short assignments) will be worth 10% of your final grade.

Absences: Regular attendance is expected. However, attendance will not be taken. With that said, it is difficult to participate when you are not here, meaning if you consistently miss class, your absences may affect your participation grade.

Midterm Exams: There will be one midterm exam. This exam will be on 10/31. The midterm exam will be worth 25% of your final grade and will be composed of both short answer and essay questions.

Final Exam: The final exam will be on Wednesday, December 17th 12:30-2:30PM. The final exam will be worth 35% of your final grade. The final exam will be composed of both short answer and essay questions, with half covering material since the midterm and half covering material from the whole course.
